At its hearing on August 21, 1985, the University Tribunal considered the following charge against you:

That in or about November 1984 in a term paper entitled 'Field Trip: Niagara Escarpment' submitted for credit in course GGR 205F you did knowingly represent as your own the ideas and expression of ideas of others contrary to s.E.1(a)(ii) of the University of Toronto Code of Behaviour on Academic Matters.

The jury found you to be guilty of this charge and imposed the following sanctions:

- suspension from the University for a period beginning immediately after the end of your current academic suspension and lasting until September of 1988;
- a notation of this suspension and the reason for it to be placed on your academic transcript until September, 1990.

The jury stated that they felt the act you had committed was a gross violation of proper behaviour for students at the University of Toronto, aggravated by the potential damage to fellow students. The jury accepted the University's submission that the sanction constituted a severe penalty because they felt that the offence warranted severity. The jury stated that they felt the sanctions were a just reward for your behaviour and would provide a deterrent to other students.
